TEAM SHOOTOUT AT TAMARACK

Our annual MGWA Team Shootout is scheduled Monday, Aug. 25, at Tamarack CC in Greenwich, CT. The Shootout, which began in 1986, employs a unique format: Two best balls of four, with a Texas Scramble. The rules, which allow 50% of adjusted handicaps, call for each player to tee off and then select the best drive in the group, after which golfers play their own ball for the rest of the hole.

With a well-respected **Charles Banks**-designed course that opened in 1929, Tamarack recently undertook a Master Plan renovation. Architect **Brian Silva**, who oversaw course changes, will be with us on Aug. 25 to discuss the renovations, along with club president **Jeff Young**. Additionally, **Larry Crawford** of BirdieBox will speak at our morning meeting. The club is set to host a sectional qualifying round for the U.S. Senior Amateur on Aug. 27, two days after our visit. NJ/PHILLY CAPTURES WRITER CUP

RDC Group, which manages several courses and clubs in the Metropolitan area, shifted its annual Writer Cup tournament from Forsgate to Shackamaxon CC in Scotch Plains, NJ, this year. Staged July 24, the event pits a team of 30-plus scribes from New York against a like number of players from New Jersey/Philadelphia, with the low 15 net scores on each side counting for a combined team score.

This year's Cup was won by NJ/Philly, which defeated defending champion NY, 1106 to 1121. A sizeable portion of attendees at Shackamaxon were MGWA members. Individually, the low NY net scores were recorded by **Paul Rogers** and **J.B. Braun**, at 68; low NY gross scores came from Rogers, with a 74, and **Mark Cannizzaro**, with 81. MGWA member **Rob Cowen** posted low gross and net for the Jersey team (76/68), while **Sean Fitzsimmons** had second low gross for NJ at 77.

NJ/PHILLY CAPTURES WRITER CUP

Close to going out of business in 2010, RDC has vastly remodeled the Shackamaxon clubhouse and upgraded numerous facilities since taking over. A resort style pool complex is being built, and all-new carts are on tap. The par 71 course, designed by **A.W. Tillinghast** and opened in 1916, also is undergoing renovation, supervised by architects and MGWA members **Stephen Kay** and **Doug Smith**. Because of adjacent new housing construction, and some invasive road building, a new par 3 13th hole --- in the Tillinghast style of a "reef" hole --- is being built, reducing the overall par by one. MARATHON RECORD AT TRUMP HV

Most golfers play 18 holes in a day, and occasionally 36, but **Tony Balassone** went far beyond the norm when he played an amazing 451 holes for charity on June 23 at Trump National Hudson Valley GC in Hopewell Junction, NY. The co-owner of Calico Restaurant and Patisserie in Rhinebeck, NY, Balassone teed off at 6:25am and, 12 hours later, had successfully completed 451 holes resulting in 1,909 shots and 48 birdies. Each year, Balassone and his wife, **Leslie**, raise money for a different charity. Last year, Tony played more than 90 holes (on foot) at Trump HV, which donated use of its course, on behalf of Multiple Sclerosis. This year, he used a cart for his 451 holes, raising more than \$25,000 for the Eric Trump Foundation, which benefits St. Jude Children's Hospital.

Dan Scavino, an ETF board member (**www.erictrumpfoundation.com**) and director of the Joe Torre Foundation, served as witness to Balassone's efforts, while promoting the incredible feat via social media and in conjunction with local radio station K104.

Tillinghast** par-70 design located around the corner/across the street from famed Winged Foot. OBIT notes from the Met PGA section: "The Met PGA lost one of its long-time staff members and a true connection to the past when Tom Strafaci Jr. lost his 10-year battle with a rare form of skin cancer recently at the age of 73. Tom was the son of legendary Dyker Beach golf professional Tom Strafaci, Sr. and he also was a PGA Member. Anyone who played in Met PGA events enjoyed the presence of Tom Jr. and his father-in-law, our incomparable scorekeeper and sign-maker Frank Blumetti who is still going strong. Our deepest sympathies to Tom's wife Ann, his sons Paul and Frank, and daughter Beth . . . We are also very saddened to report the passing of Ron Nicol, long-time head professional at Scarsdale GC and one of our most active and involved professionals, and an incredible entrepeneur. BALTUSROL TESTS Q&T CLUB GOLFERS

More than 70 MGWA members, plus a few special guests --- one of our largest turnouts in a quite a while --- attended our July 28 gathering at Baltusrol GC in Springfield, NJ, where threatening weather never materialized and a fine, dry day was enjoyed by all. The outing included: a range session with Jesse Ortiz of Bobby Jones Golf equipment, who also spoke at our indoor meeting, along with Bobby Jones apparel marketer Sonia Cozzi; presentations by 2016 PGA Championship general chairman Rick Jenkins, course renovations architect Steve Weisser of Rees Jones Inc. and MGWA/Baltusrol member Rick Wolffe. A private club with two outstanding courses, Baltusrol proved a wonderful host all day long, with arrangements graciously handled by club manager Judy Mann.

In looking ahead to the 2016 PGA, Jenkins pointed out that, due to golf being played in the Olympics (Aug. 5-21) that summer, several adjustments are planned for tour schedules. The shifts include the British Open moving earlier than usual by one week in July, the PGA (July 28-31) being played in July for the first time since 1968, and both the FedExCup playoffs and Ryder Cup being played later than their usual slots. As part of preparations for hosting the PGA, Rees Jones & Co. have been renovating the Lower Course with new bunkers and tee boxes, and some enlarged greens. The par 72 Lower will play at 7,450 yards for the championship. Onsite hospitality sales for the PGA launched this past June and registration to apply for tickets will be opened to the public next spring.

Meanwhile, the par 72 Upper Course, like the Lower an A.W. Tillinghast design, recently underwent two years of renovations by Rees Jones Inc. Weisser, with a video presentation displaying "before" and "after" scenarios, detailed the renovation of Upper bunkers and greens, construction of some new tee boxes, and restoration of approaches to various greens. "Fortunately for us, Tillie was very good at documenting his work, so that we had a lot of original plans and photographs to work with," said Weisser. "A primary goal of ours was to bring the (7,002-yard) Upper to a championship caliber equivalent to the Lower, and we feel we've achieved that."

In addition to showcasing Bobby Jones clubs on the range, Ortiz was quite candid in talking to our group with criticism about the frequency of new products shoved into the marketplace by major equipment companies and the retrenchment away from club-fitting by large retailers. "It bothers me that these big equipment companies come out with so many new products every year, products that really aren't better than what they have been selling," said Ortiz. And, pointing to the recent layoff of more than 500 PGA trained professionals by Dick's Sporting Goods: "The big box shops have destroyed club fitting. And club fitting is a key to getting golfers to play the proper equipment, which leads to more enjoyment for the game. What you'll end up with in these stores is young kids selling clubs that they are being told to push."

BALTUSROL TESTS Q&T CLUB GOLFERS

Our annual Quill & Tee GC Club Championship competition, played at scratch among MGWA members who also are part of our club-without-real estate, produced three winners: **Woody Lashen** in the men's Championship flight; **Gideon Cohen** in the A flight; **Kate Keller** in the Women's flight. The title was the third in the past four years for Lashen, who shot 76, having also won in 2011 and 2013. **John Napier** was runnerup at 81. Cohen won the A flight on a match of cards at 86 with Dave Donelson. The women's title was the first for Keller.
